# 1968 COLLEGE FOOTBALL RULES CHANGES

Probably the most publicized change made in 1968 in the collegiate football rules is the return to the 1966 regulations governing scrimmage kicks, which permits the release of interior offensive linemen immediately upon the snap of the ball to cover such kicks downfield. In 1967 these linemen had been restrained on the line until the ball was kicked.

There is quite a radical revision for 1968 which involves the basic scrimmage formation and the eligibility of forward pass receivers insofar as numbering of players is concerned. Briefly, these are the new requirements:

1. On a scrimmage down there must be at least seven players on the offensive scrimmage line, of which at least five must be numbered 50 through 79.
2. Only the players on each end of the scrimmage line are eligible receivers, and they must wear numbers **other than** 50 through 79 in order to be eligible. There can never be more than two players on the line who are eligible receivers, but there can be one, or none, depending on their numbers and where they are positioned.
3. Any player who is legally in the backfield is an eligible receiver **only** if he is wearing a number **other than** 50 through 79.

There are three changes which will be obvious to spectators and also affect coaching procedures.

1. On a kick any player who makes a signal for a fair catch, and does not touch the ball, may **not** block an opponent during that down. Infraction of this rule draws a 15-yard penalty from the spot of the foul. The restriction is designed to eliminate the practice of signalling for a fair catch, backing off, and then blocking a player of the kicking team who is attempting to down the ball.
2. The so-called "sucker shift" has been curtailed by re-enforcing the false start rule. The change prohibits an offensive lineman between the

snapper and the player on the end of the line from moving his hand(s), or making any quick movement, **after** having placed a hand or hands on or near the ground. Such action results in a penalty against the offensive team. However, players in such a position may, without penalty, be recalled to a huddle or move to "protect" themselves if a defensive player charges into the neutral zone before the snap.

3. The rule on "crack-back blocks" or legalized clipping in the clipping area has been amended. Players who are stationed five or more yards outside of the clipping area\*, or who are in motion toward the ball outside this area at the time of the snap, are not permitted to clip anywhere.

There are also these three changes which deal with "time-out" situations:

1. The length of a free time-out shall be one minute and 30 seconds instead of two minutes.
2. During this free time-out one player may confer with the coaching **staff** at the team area. This is a liberalization from one player and **one** coach.
3. Time-out shall be taken by the referee whenever Team A is awarded a first down. This allows the linesman's chains to be moved without consuming game time for such activity.

Other minor changes liberalize field marking by allowing a solid border around the field five feet in width to define the area from which all non-players are restricted. The definition of illegal equipment has been revised as it relates to face mask construction and protective covering.

\* During a scrimmage down clipping is not prohibited inside the rectangular area centered on the middle lineman of the offensive formation and extending four yards laterally in each direction and three yards longitudinally in each direction.

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## TODAY'S GAME

Arch-rivals Bridgeport and Southern Connecticut will meet for the 21st time in football at the John F. Kennedy Stadium tonight. Each school is the other's oldest football rival.

The last time the teams met here, the Purple Knights scored one of their major football victories of all time by racking up a 26-7 triumph en route to a 7-3 season. The Owls enjoyed a fine 6-3 campaign the same year.

Last year, Southern Conn. enjoyed some revenge with a thumping 41-15 victory to take a 15-5 series edge.

Both teams boast impressive offensive statistics, but have been unable to do too much scoring. This could change tonight.

UB beat Trenton State, 8-7, in its only other home game, but since has lost to Northeastern, 42-19, and undefeated Central Connecticut, 14-7. Southern Connecticut has bowed to

college division power Eastern Michigan, 40-0, and Yankee Conference member, the University of Rhode Island, 33-8, wrapped around a scoreless tie with Trenton State.

On view will be New England's leading pass catcher, UB sophomore Bob Harrison, who has caught 20 passes for 253 yards. UB quarterback Skip Rochette ranks third in the region in passing with 517 yards gained on 43 completions in 77 attempts, more than 25 passes per game. SCSC quarterback Dan Nolan is tenth with 180 yards through the air on a 54 percent aerial average.

Defensive players to watch include monster back Jim Quinn and safety Pete Pelissier for Bridgeport and middle guard Al Canalli, tackle Chuck Germe, a 260-pounder, and two-year All-New England safety Ed Manjuck for Southern Connecticut.

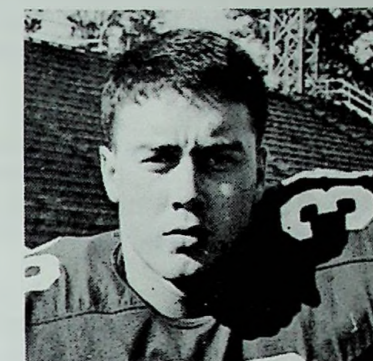

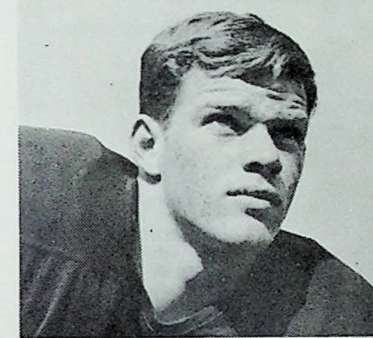

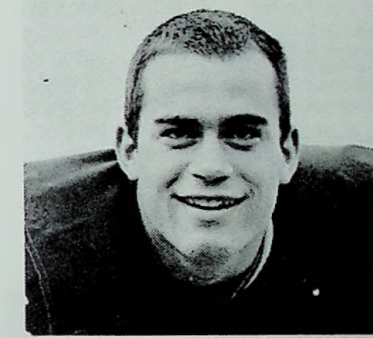

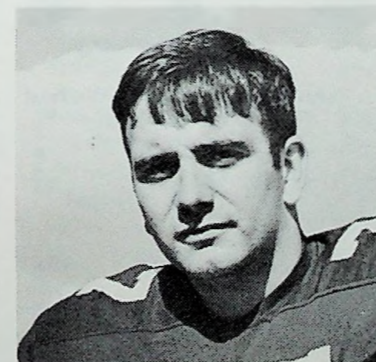

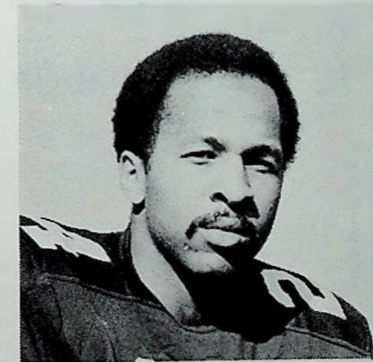

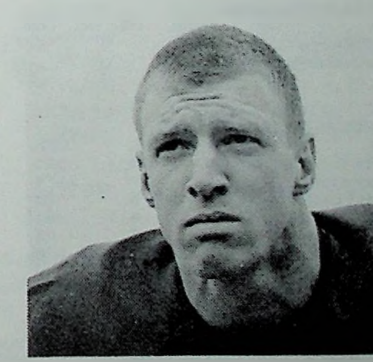

## THE PURPLE KNIGHTS

Rochette has completed 43 of 77 passes for 517 yards and two touchdowns. His completion average is a fine 56 percent. He has already broken the pass completion record for one game with 22 against Northeastern.

The 6-1, 195 pound junior is nearing the season's marks for pass completions which is 73, set by the late John Corr in 1965, and for total yardage which is 750, also established by Corr in 1965.

Rochette's latest effort was a 14 for 25 performance for 192 yards in a 14-7 loss to Central Connecticut last Saturday. One of his passes went for 45 yards and a touchdown to tailback Darrick Warner.

Sophomore Bob Harrison continues to be the team's top receiver with 20 catches for 253 yards. The school mark is 36, set by Joe Cirone in 1953. Wingback Phil Johnson has caught seven passes for 74 yards and end Dwight Fowler five for 68 yards.

Warner took over the team rushing lead by gaining 90 yards against Central Connecticut which included a 37-yard scamper. He also caught three passes for another 64 yards to account for more than 150 yards.

The junior from Mount Vernon, N.Y., has now rushed for 181 yards this season with an average of 3.6 yards per carry. Fullback Bob Riggio is second in this department with 101 yards and a 3.1 average.

# THE OWLS

Southern Connecticut State College hasn't had much to cheer about in its first three football games but the Owls appear to have a genuine triple threat in sophomore quarterback Dan Nolan.

Nolan leads the Owls in rushing, passing and punting. The 6-1, 185-pounder from Valley Stream, N.Y., accounted for almost all of the Owls' total offense in last Saturday's 33-8 loss to Rhode Island. Southern's record is 0-2-1.

In the rushing department Nolan leads SCSC in carries (47) and net yards gained (147). His 3.1 average per carry is second only to junior Vin Russell, who has a 3.8 average with 94 yards gained on 25 carries.

Nolan's passing figures are even more impressive. He has hit on 20 of 37 passes for a fine .541

completion percentage. His passes have gained 180 yards and accounted for all of Southern's scoring on a TD pass and a two-point conversion.

The lanky quarterback also handles the punting chores. He has booted the ball 20 times for 674 yards and a 33.7 average. He has been getting more foot into the ball recently and against Rhode Island got off one kick of 48 yards.

Split end Bernie Garibaldi is the team leader in two categories. He is the top pass receiver with eight receptions for 100 yards. He has also scored Southern's only touchdown and consequently leads the team in scoring with six points.

Southern's deep secondary picked off two passes against Rhode Island for a total of six for the season. Safety Ed Manjuck leads with three interceptions.

## A LOOK AT SOUTHERN CONNECTICUT

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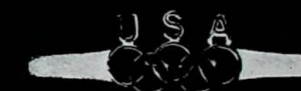
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# HUMPTY-DUMPTY WORDS

WHEN OLD Humpty-Dumpty ("Alice in Wonderland") r'ared back and said "When I use a word it means just what I choose it to mean—neither more nor less"—I get the feeling that a lot of football coaches nowadays have been taking lessons from 'ol Hump.

These locker-room lads have a knack of phrasing answers that has even politicians drooling over the way football coaches give that old bush a beating. Coaches lead the league in issue-avoiding, punch-pulling and angle-shooting.

But with a little practice, a lot of ESP, and an inherited gift for out-and-out mind-reading, one can readily understand every word uttered by any football coach in any section of the country. Let me show you what I mean. I will begin with the coach's statement and then follow it with REAL meaning in parenthesis:

"I have only one desire for this team—and that's to make this a game of fun for the boys." ("And just as soon as I can get rid of Texas, Alabama and Southern Cal some nut AD put on our schedule, we'll play Rose Poly, Slippery Rock and Middlesaps—truly FUN teams.")

"This team plays for breaks." ("We're so slow and inept we have to hope we'll get referees to match.")

"We have been handicapped this

season by an accident-prone team." ("These guys are so dainty they ought to be playing in aprons. They check in the infirmary with nose-bleeds or dandruff. They're such a bunch of hypochondriacs they put the tackling dummy in the whirlpool bath.")

"I look for our quarterback to take his place among the all-time statistic leaders." ("Yeah, all the statistics on the minus side. Career lost yards. Season fumbles. Single game signal stubs and balls eaten. He's made our own All-Opponent team three years running. He doesn't play football, he hoards it. Ask him to pass the catsup and he goes to one knee.")

"Man, you really heard some hitting out there today." ("Unfortunately, most of it was our guys hitting the ground and getting knocked on their rears.")

"Listen, all this team needs is one more good running back." ("Then we'd have a total of one.")

"We'll move the ball on anybody." ("Unfortunately, toward our own goal line—and occasionally laterally.")

"There isn't one single reason this team can't win the conference title." ("To be exact, there are 11 of them.")
