Three Groups Will Combine For Banquet

The Sociology Colloquium and the Political Relations Forum are combining forces with the newly formed national honorary Social Science fraternity, Pi Gamma Mu, this year to hold their annual banquet, on May 4, 1954 at the Stratfield Hotel. This promises to be one of the biggest affairs of the year for these organizations.

The principal speaker of the evening will be Mr. Herman Steinkraus, president of the Bridgeport Brass Company. The Colloquium and Forum will also present awards to outstanding persons in those fields. President James H. Halsey will officially initiate the new honor society charter members and the current officers who are: Mr. Emerson Chamberlain, faculty sponsor; Mr. James Fenner, faculty secretary-treasurer; Dianne MacDougall, president; and John Vossler, vice president. The new chapter obtained its charter in March 1954 and is the newest honor society on our campus.

The Sociology Colloquium is ending a very active year, having taken field trips and having sponsored three ethnic dinners — Jewish Night, Greek Night and Puerto Rican Night.

The Political Relations Forum has conducted most of the elections, and has sent a large delegation to the annual Student In-

Twenty-One Girls Nominated As Wistaria Contest Closes

Twenty-one UB coeds have been nominated for the 1954 "Wistaria Queen." Many of them represent different fraternities and sororities and the winner will reign as the monarch of beauty for the coming school year.

The so called dead season has finally passed. Three of the four varsity sports are underway, the fourth opens Friday, what might prove to be the two biggest games in intramural softball are on tap for this week, and UB sports fans are wondering which of the events to attend.

Prospects for the spring sports program at this school seem good, better in fact than at any previous time in the history of athletics here.

Baseball, despite a few early season setbacks, has started to come around and John McKeon's charges can't help but post the best mark ever turned in by a Bridgeport nine.

The team is strong at every position and there is depth everywhere but at first base. Hitting poses no problem with Dick Gianesello and Jimmy Davins swatting away (through the Danbury game) at .545 and .417 respectively, Harry Noyes hitting .364 and Ronnie Krause belting .333.

A few good bounces in UB's direction and the team will go a lot farther than anyone expected they would last September. The schedule is far from easy but the road ahead does not look too bumpy.

They say that fools rush in where wise men fear to tread, but Kitty Bogan is no fool and she is certainly rushing into a predicament. The former women's amateur tennis champion is taking over the sport which posted a 17 won, 4 lost record during its tryout at the university (1949-50). Trying to keep up that record with a team that has never faced intercollegiate competition, before will be no easy job, but the first female coach at UB shows no signs of backing down or forgetting the whole thing.

To make things a little tougher, the Athletic Department has added Hofstra College to the already loaded schedule that includes teams such as Adelphi and Wesleyan as well as the sectional rivalries.

When Bob Mendes was declared ineligible for track it broke the Mendes-Walt Kondratovich sport streak that had been going on since September. Mendes was a member of both the football and swimming teams under "Kay" and when he went out for track his friends starting asking questions.

The loss of Mendes along with Norm Victor will be felt by Kondratovich, but talent this year is as thick as bees around honey and Brooklyn Poly won't have the soft touch they expected when they invade Seaside Park, Friday afternoon.

Always strong in the field events, this year's squad has been bolstered by the addition of several very fine runners and is the most well rounded team ever to wear the Purple and White.

New Britain State Teachers College will be looking to retire the Connecticut small school Track Trophy at the state meet this year, having won the title for the past two years, and off last year's performances it will be up to the Knights to break that streak.

The golf team under Al Sherman got lumped last year for the first time in its history and the squad will be looking to avenge the 3-6-1 slate it turned in 1953.

Sherman, who returned last season after a two year absence, found few veterans and was hurt in mid-season by the loss of his number one man because of scholastic difficulties. With acting captain Dick Watt and Sammy Marks heading the list of veterans and several top notch newcomers added to the roster, the suicide 11 match sked could show some interesting results.

Track Sked Opens As Knights Meet Brooklyn Polytech

Brooklyn Polytech Institute will invade Seaside Park, as the fifth edition of the University of Bridgeport's track team opens its 1954 season Friday afternoon. The meet will mark the first meeting between the two schools in this sport and will open Walt Kondratovich's third season as coach of the UB cindermen.

Except for a shortage of dash men the team looks pretty well stacked, but "Kay" is pinning his hopes on Dick Fresolene, Marv Racer and Stu Randell in the 100 and 220 yard runs.

Dick Cipriani, who may see action in the 220, and Dave Deep are the squad's mainstays in the 440, while Al Clinkscales and Jim Halsey Jr. are expected to start in the half mile. Kenny Wisner seems the only bright spot in the distance events and will run in both the mile and two mile contests.

The relay team, which looks to be the best in the school's history will be out to break the record of 3:57 set last year against Fairfield University will be made up of Cipriani, Clinkscales, Halsey and Hans Schneider.

The field team is, exceptionally strong with Joe Cirone and Paul Hennion both entered in the shot put trying to break the 45' 1 3/4" record set by Norman Pascal in 1950. Hennion and Phil DuBreuil will be hurling the discus with Hennion also flipping the javelin. "Dub" and "Red" Griffin are high jumping while the "mighty string-bean" is entered in the broad jump along with Ralph Consiglio. Roland Emery is going after the pole vault laurels.

After the Poly meet, the Purple Knights will travel to New Britain April 28 to play the Blue Devils of TCC.

Knights Sock New Haven For Second Straight Win

Fairfield Stags In '54 Inaugural Defeat Linksters

The University of Bridgeport Golf Team fell before arch rival Fairfield University 6-3 as the Knights opened their 1954 season Tuesday on the Fairchild Wheeler Course. Bridgeport was able to keep abreast of the Red Stags until the very last hole when the enemy opened the gap.

On the brighter side for the UB squad was Dick Lockwood, who showed his prowess, as he defeated Bill Lannon 4-3. Lockwood also collaborated with Ed Stanczyk as they defeated Quinn and Lannon in the doubles 3-2. The visitors success was mostly dependant on Jim Homa who defeated Sam Marks 3-2 and Art Panero who managed to defeat Walt Leveen 3-2.

A fired-up Bridgeport nine evened their season record over the Easter Holiday when they roared back with two lop-sided wins over Danbury State Teachers 16-7 and New Haven State Teachers 10-4 on the Seaside Diamond.

Trailing 5-1 in the fourth inning of the Danbury fracas a week ago Wednesday, the Knights looked a sure bet to blow their third straight. However, once the flickering UB aggregation caught fire there was no extinguisher that could handle them. No less than 18 Bridgeport batters went to the plate in the 13 run flaming fourth.

Gene Zewinski started on the mound for the Knights with Will Umstadter taking over in the fourth. Umstadter pitched superlative ball as he allowed only 3 hits throughout the last 6 frames.

Returning to the scene Monday the Knights showed positive signs of being over their early season slump. This time the Park City nine wasted no time as they got to the New Haven pitcher, Bill Beebe, for six runs in the first inning.

Ronnie Krause started the ball flying as he opened the Bridgeport first with a single to left. After Harry Noyes walked, Dick Gianesello was safe on an error filling the sacks. Jimmy Davins and Joe Marrucco drew passes forcing in a pair of runs with Harry Peters belting the next pitch for a two-run single.

The second inning was almost a carbon copy of the first for Bridgeport as they piled on four more markers with a single by Dennie Callahan, a hit batsman and a pair of doubles by Davins and Marrucco.

The Bridgeport moundsmen again hit their stride in this contest. In his first start Dick Lugg yielded only four hits over a seven inning stint. When Lugg showed signs of faltering in the late innings Bill McCooey was equal to the task as he shut out New Haven with one hit in the last two frames.

AGP — Callahan Meet Today; Park, POC In First Place

Dick Mustapich will face Ralph "Blackie" Consiglio as Alpha Gamma Phi and Callahan AC meet this afternoon at Seaside Park in what could prove to be the deciding game of the American League race.

Mustapich, who has two straight shutout wins under his belt, including a no-hitter against SPA and a one hitter against KBR, has been tabbed as the top hurler in IM history, but he will be facing a team that is loaded from top to bottom, and a top flight flinger in Consiglio.

KBR became Musty's second victim as AGP rolled to an easy 28-0 victory. Mustapich limited the losers to just one scratch hit, that a disputed play on which two men had a chance to make a play on the ball, but as neither man had his glove on the ball, the official scorer scored the play as a hit.

SPA-Callahan Tie

In other games SPA twice came from behind to tie Callahan 5-5 in a game called after 13 innings because of darkness. Consiglio, who did the hurling for the AC, saw leads of 4-3 and 5-4 disappear (Mustapich set this same SPA team down without a hit).

The National League race which is fast shaping up into a two team conflict, will come to a head Monday when POC and Park Hall clash. Both teams have identical league leading, 2-0 records and a win for either team could well determine the loop's champion.

With Stan Silverberg and Bob Mendes doing the blasting, the in the eighth and twelfth innings. Hall downed APO 22-0 behind the four hit pitching of Dick Hestman for Park's second victory.

POC Wins Squeaker

POC gained their second win by defeating DEB 7-6. Gary Singer had the game well under control until he tired in the sixth inning and had to be relieved by Gary Zitomer. DEB pushed across three quick tallies but fell short of victory as Zitomer got Gordon Robertson on a line drive to right field.
