BRIDGEPORT: A BRIEF HISTORY

In 1639 the city we know as Bridgeport was settled by residents of Stratford and Fairfield and called Newfield. The year 1800 saw its incorporation as a borough. It was named Bridgeport for the first drawbridge over the Pequonnock river. In 1821 it was incorporated as a town.

The early agrarian settlers turned to manufacturing and mercantile pursuits because of the town's advantages geographical location and its excellent harbor on Long Island sound. Incorporation as a city came in 1836, and Bridgeport grew from a shipping community of 3,000 to a world famous industrial centre.

In 1882 P.T. Barnum, one of the city's best known residents and former mayor, said of Bridgeport that "... its nearness to New York and the facilities for daily transit to and from the metropolis were . . . partial considerations only in the general advantages the location seemed to offer. Nowhere, in all my travels in America and abroad, had I seen a city whose very position presented so many and varied attractions."

In fact, it was the famous showman himself who was responsible for Seaside Park, one of Bridgeport's greatest attractions. It was at his insistence and with some of his funds that the beautiful park upon which UB borders was created.

Another well-known mayor was Jasper McLevy, Bridgeport's first and only Socialist mayor. His election in 1933 began a 24-year reign as the nation's best publicized mayor.

Today Bridgeport has an airport and good rail service. The 129 mile long Connecticut turnpike runs through the heart of the city, and the Merritt Parkway is easily accessible. A variety of manufactured items, including home appliances, machinery, ammunition, brass goods, plastics and drugs, are produced by its industries.

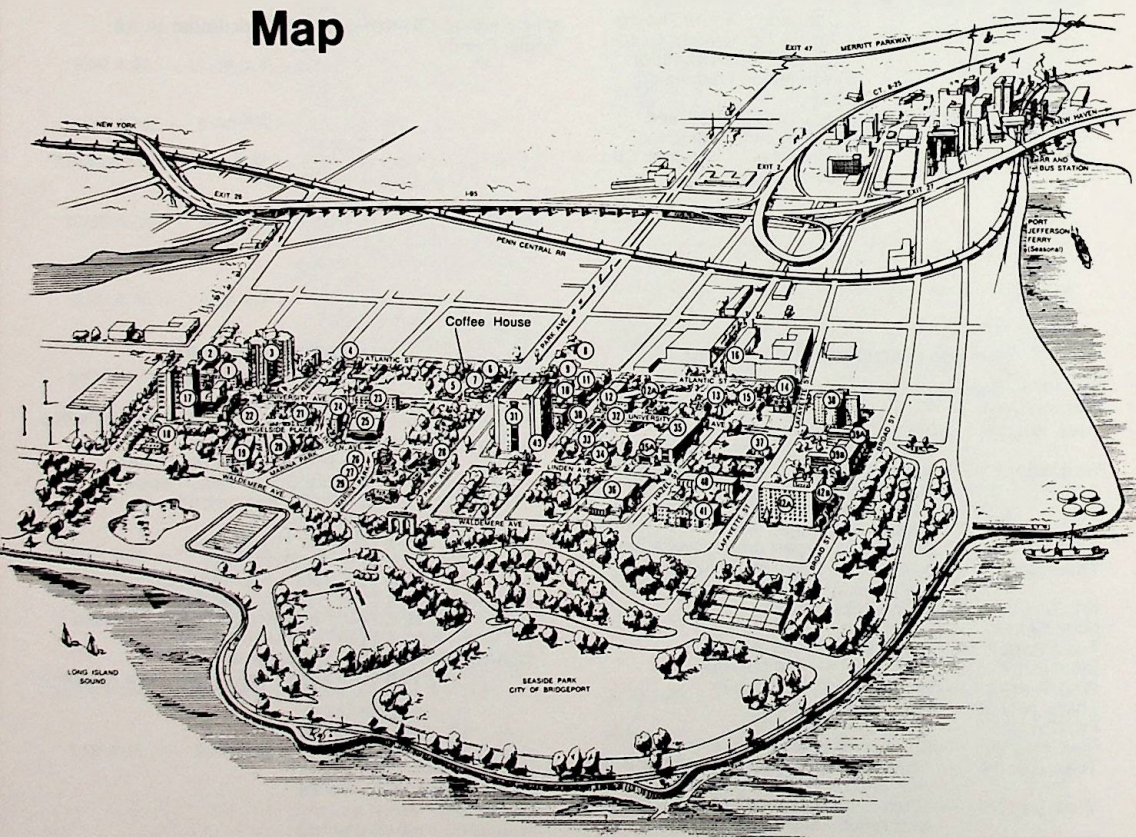

STUDENT CENTER BOARD OF DIRECTORS

The Student Center Board of Directors (BOD) is a student organization consisting of interested students working together to provide social, cultural, and educational functions throughout campus.

It consists of four committees; Entertainment, Concert, Informal Education and Coffee House.

This year over 100 programs are being planned under the Board's authority. Friday and Sunday night films, concerts, the coffee house (located on Park Ave. to the rear of Bryant Hall) which operates Thursday-Sunday nights and provides an informal atmosphere where students can gather and enjoy entertainment and films while they relax and meet with friends. BOD also sponsors mixers, temporary pubs, lectures, and other special events, which are provided free or at a low cost through BOD's programming board. RESIDENCE HALL ASSOCIATION

The association is financed by a percentage of the receipts from the vending machines located in each residence hall.

COMMUTERS' SENATE

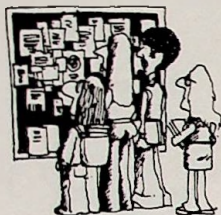

SCRIBE

The **SCRIBE** is the campus bi-weekly newspaper published on Tuesdays and Thursdays during the academic year by University students. It is comprised of campus and community news as well as features, editorials, and letters to the editor. It serves the University community as a major source of information and communication. All students are invited to participate in the areas of reporting, advertising, photography, and editing. If interested, stop by their second floor offices in the Student Center.

WPKN RADIO

WPKN's AM system is a closed-circuit station serving UB dorm students exclusively at 540 on the AM dial. The FM station is well-received by the general public from Long Island and Westchester, throughout most of Connecticut, at 89.5 on the FM dial.

WPKN is staffed by UB students, on a voluntary basis. Positions include announcing, record cataloging, writing and production of public affairs programs and public service announcements, news reporting, writing and production, and staff engineering.

Because WPKN operates on a voluntary basis, everyone is there because they want to be, not because they have to be. No one's trying to impress anyone else for a grade, or for credits, or for pay. And the staff is open to UB students regardless of major or class standing.

The radio station is located in Rm. 202 on the top floor of the Student Center. Listen, and stop by for more information.



SEASIDE VIDEO

SEASIDE VIDEO is a weekly television program produced by interested University students. No experience is necessary to become a part of this fast-growing campus medium which involves the use of portable video and studio equipment. Positions are available in all aspects of pre- and post-production including camera work, video-tape editing, as well as some on-camera work. Presently, the programs are being viewed in the Student Center lounging area at designated times during the week; however, future plans extending this student operation so that it can be seen elsewhere on closed-circuit. 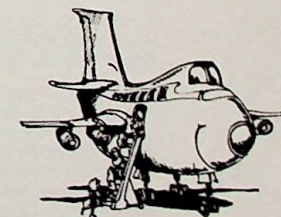
INTERFAITH CENTER

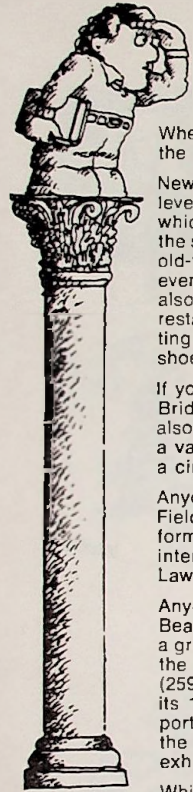

THINGS TO DO AND SEE IN AND AROUND BRIDGEPORT

Whether your interests lie in sports, dancing, cultural events, or good food and music, Bridgeport and the surrounding area may have something for you.

New to the campus area is an attractive mini-shopping mall called University Square. On the first level of the building known as the Corset Factory, you will find the Barnes and Nobles Bookstore, which not only sells books, but also those last minute items that you may have forgotten to pack . . . on the same floor there's the Gazebo Ice Cream Parlour which lets you enjoy homemade ice cream in an old-fashioned atmosphere. Have complicated ice cream concoctions or just a plain cone. There's even Frogurt — frozen yogurt for the diet-conscious ice cream lovers. Shakes, sodas, and coffee are also served . . . For a "stiffer" drink, walk upstairs to the second level which you'll find Barnaby's, a restaurant-bar with an intimate atmosphere by day and a discotheque with a fast-paced New York setting at night . . . You'll also want to take in the other shops in the Square offering a wide variety of shoes, assorted apparel, jewelry, silver, and liquor.

If you enjoy museums and exhibits, the Museum of Art, Science and Industry at 4450 Park Ave. in Bridgeport (372-3521) has exhibits which are accurately described by the Museum's name. There is also a planetarium there . . . The P.T. Barnum Museum at 820 Main St. in Bridgeport (576-7320) has a variety of exhibits including P.T. Barnum and Tom Thumb memorabilia, an Egyptian mummy and a circus reference library . . .

Anyone who likes cartoons and comics will enjoy the Museum of Cartoon Art and Hall of Fame at 384 Field Point Road in Greenwich (1-661-4502). The history and production of cartoon art in its many forms (comic strips, animated films, comic books) are explored in its exhibits . . . Anyone who is interested in early legal memorabilia and judicial and historical art should visit the Fairfield County Law Library located in the Fairfield County Court House at 1061 Main St. in Bridgeport (367-7468).

Anyone who enjoys animals and nature will want to visit the Beardsley Zoological Gardens at Beardsley Park in Bridgeport (576-8082). The zoo has a variety of birds and animals, gardens and a greenhouse, and is adjacent to the facilities of Beardsley Park . . . If you enjoy nature trails visit the Connecticut Audubon Center and Larsen Audubon Sanctuary at 2325 Burr Street in Fairfield (259-6305). Along with an environmental study center the sanctuary offers over six miles of trails on its 152 acres . . . The Nature Center for Environmental Activities, Inc. at 10 Woodside Lane in Westport (1-227-7253) has a 53-acre sanctuary, trails, an animal shelter and exhibits . . . Back indoors the Peabody Museum at 170 Whitney Avenue in New Haven (1-436-0850) has a variety of exhibits which include anthropology, dinosaurs, mammals and the history of life.

While you're in New Haven you might want to stop at the Yale University Art Gallery on the corner of Chapel and York streets (1-436-0574). Among the collections is a permanent collection of 20th century paintings. Also on display are sculpture, pre-Columbian, African, Oriental and European Art. Gallery talks are held, and special exhibits are frequently on display . . . More art can be seen at the Silvermine Guild of Artists in New Canaan (1-966-5617), where the exhibits change often. If you enjoy crafts, stop at the Brookfield Craft Center in Brookfield (1-775-4526) where you can see crafts of every type.

Theatre lovers will want to take advantage of some of the excellent theatre in the area. Both the Yale Repertory Theatre (1-436-1600) and Long Wharf Theatre (1-787-4282 in New Haven) offer student discounts and sell subscription tickets . . . The Shubert Theatre, also in New Haven, is a frequent stop for many shows before they reach Broadway) (1-787-1297) . . . The new Downtown Cabaret Theatre located at 263 Golden Hill Street in Bridgeport carries on the cabaret tradition begun in Bridgeport not too long ago . . . Just a few miles down the turnpike (off exit 32) is the world-renowned American Shakespeare Theatre in Stratford. It offers the best of Shakespeare and other well-known playwrights . . . And don't miss the productions put on by UB's theatre department as those at area colleges.

Movie fans will be glad to know that there are no less than 15 movie theatres and drive-ins within a 20 minute distance of UB. Some of them offer student discounts; others have special 99¢ nights. Check the **Bridgeport Post** for a complete listing.

There are a lot of clubs and bars in the area, so it's impossible to name them all, but here are a few that you might enjoy . . . The Beachside at 692 Penfield Road in Fairfield (255-0127) offers live entertainment and reasonably priced drinks. Dress and atmosphere are casual . . . The Center Restaurant at 1418 Post Road in Fairfield Center is a great place on Thursday, Friday and Saturday when good local bands play and there's no cover charge. Drinks are moderately priced and it's easy to meet people there . . . The Crossroads at 323 N. Main Street in Westport (1-225-5200) has live bands and is pretty lively. No jeans, please . . . At the Dram Shop Cafe at 272 E. State Street (Rt. 1) in Westport (1-226-9073) you can order even the most exotic drink while sitting and talking with friends in an intimate atmosphere.

. . . While you're out there, check out the Fore 'N Aft at 630 Post Road in Westport (1-227-8860). It's the place to stomp your feet and boogie . . . At the Kingsmen Pub at 50 Main Street you're likely to run into friends from school as well as Bridgeport natives. Drinks are reasonable . . . Maloney's at 308 Iranistan Ave. (up the street from the A&H Building) is another place where you'll see people from UB. But the Knickerbocker bar (3 blocks north of the Student Center on Myrtle Ave.), better known as the "Knick," usually draws large UB crowds on almost any night . . . The player's Tavern (located at the Westport Country playhouse on Rt. 1 in Westport) has live music and food if you're hungry. The atmosphere is casual . . .

Other places which might be of interest are the Wonderland of ice at Glenwood Park (576-8110) if you like ice skating, the Fairchild Wheeler Golf Course (576-8083) in north Bridgeport and the Bridgeport Public Library at 925 Broad St. in Bridgeport (576-7403) . . . Bridgeport is also the home of the world's largest Jai-alai fronton. This action-packed game has become increasingly popular, attracting people from many states. Spectators bet on their favorite teams to "clean up" in this high-speed game similar to handball. A \$3.00 bet may pay as high as \$9,300.00!!! Games are played Monday through Friday at 7:15 p.m. and Saturday at 7:00 p.m. (Balcony seats-\$1.65) There are Wednesday and Saturday matinees at 12 noon (all seats \$2.00). The fronton is located off of exit 28 on the Connecticut Turnpike . . . There are many events and places which can't be listed here because of space but this will give you a start. Read the papers and keep your eyes and ears open — you'll find there's a lot for you to do!!!

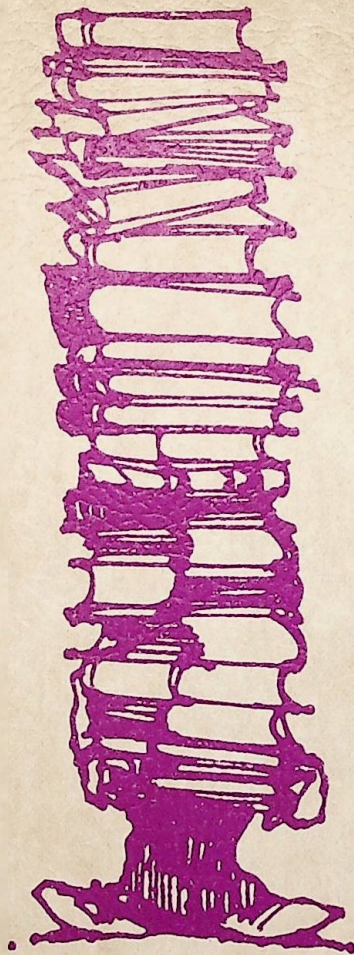
